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# The Makerspace at Douglass Branch

## Overview | July 2025–December 2025

### Makerspace Drop-ins & Programming

From July through December, **189 community members** utilized the Saturday Drop-ins. Additionally, Saturday gaming sessions remain a major draw for local youth with 15–20 kids attending each week.

### Introductory Series for Makerspace Tools

Attendance and interest are growing for the Intro to Series each month. From July through December, **23 community members** participated in introductory sessions related to sewing, Cricut machines, and our Glowforge machines.

### Equipment Usage: Sewing, 3D Printing, and Cricut Machines

Staff continue to see steady usage on the sewing machines, with patrons utilizing the machines for a variety of personal and creative projects. The Cricut remains a popular tool, with ongoing demand from patrons working on crafting, personalization, and design projects. Interest in 3D printing continues to grow steadily and staff as seeing a higher demand for 3D printing services.



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# The Studio at the Library

## Overview | July 2025–December 2025

### Book-A-Librarian Appointments

From July to December, library staff met individually with **63 community members** people how to use new technology including the Glowforge laser cutter, Cricut machines, recording booths, sewing machines, and 3D printers.

### New Equipment & Software

A sublimation printer was purchased for The Studio which will fulfill frequent customer requests for personalized items – including photographs and complex logos on mugs, which we were unable to accommodate before with existing equipment. Auto Press will complement existing heat press tools, enhancing the overall experience, and for anyone with physical disabilities preventing them from putting pressure on a heatpress or lifting the hand-held heat presses, the autopress handles that on its own. Affinity, a new software added to Studio laptops, will be offered as an alternative to Adobe Illustrator/Photoshop and Inkscape for a more user-friendly experience.

### Expanding Tech Programs

A new workshop titled “Digitizing Physical Media” workshop was implemented that demonstrates how to create digital copies and principles of how best to scan different kinds of media.

### Crafting Series

In July, a informal craft series was added down in The Studio. The series features seasonal themes and activities for all ages and encourages creativity and community participation

### Programming in The Studio

From July through December, **33 programs** were offered in The Studio with **508 community members** in attendance for regular programming including Crafty Adults, Writer’s Workshop, Studio Workshops, and our Getting Started with Tech series.
